# Trek inspires Scouts to ponder their call

**SPARTANBURG**—The challenge to continue the powerful, spiritual experience of the Bishop England Trek was accepted, and accomplished.

Returning recently from an 18-day hike with Scouts along the Foothills Trail in the Upstate, organizers expressed gratitude that they surpassed the challenge issued by Bishop Robert E. Guglielmone two years ago, when the event first began.

The Bishop England Trek is a collaborative effort of the Dioceses of Charleston and Savannah that seeks to promote vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life among young Scouts.

"It is an opportunity for Scouts to experience backpacking within our own backyard," said Father Matthew Gray, Scouting chaplain for the Diocese of Charleston. "Hiking with priests and seminarians, they not only confront the hardships of the trail but also confront the hard question 'What does God want me to do with my life?""

The teens are supported with daily Mass, prayer, vocations talks, and faith sharing with youth their own age, Father Gray said.

The event is named after Bishop John England and is patterned after the St. George Trek, an outdoor hiking and retreat experience established by Bishop Guglielmone about 25 years ago at the Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico.

This year attracted 16 participants, who gathered in Spartanburg on June 10 to begin their first day of the trek with a celebration of Mass.

Father Pablo Magione, vocations director for the Diocese of Savannah,

spoke to the Scouts and compared the trek to a spiritual pilgrimage to experience God and grow in spiritual life.

Each participant received a cross as a sign that he would use the hike as a personal pilgrimage to grow closer to God. They did this not only through prayer and spiritual growth, but also by facing challenges such as difficult terrain, exhaustion, dehydration and fatigue.

Every obstacle on the trail that one managed to overcome spoke of overcoming sin and temptation, organizers said.

In addition to Father Gray, adult advisers included Father Jason Adams, Diocese of Savannah Scout chaplain, Adorno Father Giovannie "Gio" Nunez, and two Adorno seminarians.

"I think it was a great opportunity for the Scouts to experience nature, solitude and silence away from the noises of the world so that they could hear the call to which God is calling them," Father Gio said.

The trek concluded on June 18 with Mass at Oconee State Park, where parents were able to share the joy and success of the expedition.

In his homily, Bishop Guglielmone reminded the Scouts to continue to listen to God's call, always present in the silence of one's heart; and to maintain lessons in perseverance.

"It takes so much humility also for one to acknowledge difficulties on the trail and either pull off the trail or stop for rest to regain strength," the bishop said "An act of charity is shown when one stumbles and can't walk and others help. Charity indeed begins at home, but when we realize we are on the same pilgrimage in this world, we see the need of helping others."


